15 Feb 2016	<p>Professor John Borrows QC presented at the "Interpreting the Treaty over 175 years" symposium held at Victoria University of Wellington. This symposium took a scholarly look at the various legal, historical, political, philosophical and policy dimensions of "interpreting the Treaty" through time. As 2015 was the 175th anniversary of the Treaty texts, it was timely to reflect on how these texts and the relations they evidence have been interpreted across time from 1840, with an acute eye to how those interpretations may have changed or adapted and in what circumstances.</p>

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
